After WWI, war brides waited for their chance to travel overseas and unite with their husbands. The 1918/1919 flu epidemic, dockyard strikes and dedication of ships for returning soldiers, delayed many reunions. Come learn about the experience of a Dufferin County WWI war bride.



Passenger ships like the S.S. Tunisian of the Allan Line (Canadian Pacific) made trips from major ports in Liverpool, London, and Glasgow to Canada often carrying immigrants. Many immigrants travelled in steerage and were prone to seasickness. Come discover who travelled on this ship.



As early as 1872, children under the care of Barnardo Homes (care centres for orphans and destitute children) were being sent to Canada. The practice of sending children to Canada continued until 1939. More than 20,000 "home children" were sent to Canada by the Barnardo institution. Come discover a Barnardo child who ended up in Dufferin County.

Students will investigate historical experiences and perspectives of individuals who helped make Dufferin County what it is today. Working in small groups, students will follow the story of one person's life. They must follow clues, answer questions and complete activities before they can find out more about their journey to Canada.

Learning Outcomes:

Understand and interpret different reasons why people immigrated to and settled in Dufferin County by investigating primary and secondary sources.

Draw conclusions based on evidence about push/pull factors that encouraged or discouraged settlement.

Assess the impact socio-economic status had on emigration/immigration, including which and how political affiliations and cultural backgrounds influenced settlement in Dufferin County.

Explore local maps to become more familiar with local geography and assess how the natural landscape affected settlement in Dufferin County.
