CELEBRATIONS



Teacher's Guide

Available in November, December and January

OVERVIEW:

People celebrate many different holidays in the winter months. This 1-hour program will have students exploring many different winter celebrations and traditions, along with reflecting on their own. They will compare these traditions to find similarities between them.

ACTIVITIES:

Lunar New Year (The Lantern Festival)

Students will learn about the Lunar New Year as a celebration of the arrival of spring and the beginning of a new year on the lunisolar calendar. It is the most important holiday in China, and it is also widely celebrated in South Korea, Vietnam, and countries with a significant Chinese population. The final day of the holiday is the Lantern Festival, in which children carry lanterns around to mark the end of the celebration. Students will also have a chance to make their own paper lantern like those used during the festival each year.

Diwali

Students will learn about the history of Diwali, where it is celebrated and its similarities to other celebrations that happen in the winter. They will explore the significance of the use of light during celebrations around this time of year.

Hanukkah

Students will discover the story behind Hanukkah through a variety of items. They will learn how this story is remembered by Jewish families during Hanukkah through the Dreidel game and the lighting of the menorah. They will also compare its traditions with other celebrations.

Kwanzaa

Through exploration of Kwanzaa, students will learn the values that are celebrated by African American people during Kwanzaa and compare the kinara to the menorah.

Christmas

Students will learn about the history of Christmas and how it compares to other celebrations. Students will also have a chance to talk about the significance of gift giving during the winter holidays.

ACTIVITIES (CONTINUED):

Winter Solstice

Students will learn about the significance of the Winter Solstice to various cultures and the science behind why it occurs. They will also learn about the specific First Nations game called Dish that was traditionally played during important celebrations and events.

CURRICULUM CONNECTIONS:

A1: Application: Why Traditions Change

Compare some significant traditions and celebrations among diverse groups and at different times, including those of First Nations, Métis, and/or Inuit, and identify some of the reasons for changes in these traditions/celebrations.

A2: Inquiry: Past and Present Traditions

Use the social studies inquiry process to investigate some of the past and present traditions and celebrations within their own family and the communities to which they belong.

A3: Understanding Context: Tradition and Heritage

Describe some of the major groups in their community, including First Nations, Métis, and/or Inuit, other diverse communities, and different types of families, and some of the ways in which traditions and heritage are passed on by such groups.
