Tips and Tricks:

- Start with yourself and work backwards. Record your details and the details of any siblings (name, date of birth, place of birth, where you live) then your parents, grandparents and so on.
- Talk to everyone around you. Gather names, places, dates and events. Ask or contact your family members to share stories. Treat every statement as a clue to your ancestral story.
- **Seek out historic records.** Use records to verify story details. Collect marriage records, old letters and photos, birth, naturalization, citizenship, death certificates, census records, etc. Save copies or take a digital picture.
- Start at the end of an ancestor's life. Often starting with a person's death certificate and obituary can provide helpful information and details about their life story.
- Always check original documents. Transcriptions are not always reliable. If you have trouble ready cursive handwriting, ask for help.

Family Research Extension Activities:

• Create a timeline of important dates in an ancestor's life



- Research important events that happened during an ancestor's lifetime
- Research to learn about places your ancestors lived. Mark these places on a map. Consider using GoogleMyMaps
- Conduct an interview with an elder in your family (in person, over the phone, by video chat, or letter writing)
- Create a puzzle out of your family tree
- Investigate a family heirloom. What is its story?
- Create a scrapbook of favourite family memories
